


Andy's Travelogue



Camp Lutherlyn News

THERLYN CAMP A brief update on Camp Lutherlyn.... The camp's AGM was held on June 22nd. The 2018 financials were good:

- 2018 net income of just over \$8,000, resulting in a total operating reserve, of \$47,000, a very comfortable amount.
- Just under \$50,000 is held in restricted funds for the legacy project to expand washrooms a project that will start this fall.
- \$3,500 is held in restricted funds for camperships. (Speaking of which if you know any children who want to go to camp but require a subsidy tell them to request that with their registration form.)

In addition, Camp Lutherlyn has available \$202,000 from the proceeds of selling the Camp Edgewood property to be used for capital improvements. A number of projects have already begun.

Thanks were extended to outgoing Board members Randy Zimmerling, Rev. Bruce Thompson, Rev. Paul Roellchen-Pfohl, Brent Wolfgram and Brenda Tromp for all their love and support of the camp. Welcome was given to re-elected Board members Janice Verch (the new Board Chair), Erik Holzschuh (the new Board Secretary and document retention leader), and to new Board members – Robert Tremblay (Vice-Chair), Rev. Sue Neville for a 3-year term, Dennis Jensen for a 2-year term, and Bonnie Weppler and Alison Burkett (Treasurer) for a 1-year term.

A brief presentation was given on the new business plan. The essence of it is:

- 1. The camp's mission/ purpose is first, to run camps: Kids and Teen Camps and a new Family Camp, and also support groups like the OPP camp for disadvantaged aboriginal youth, and Martin Luther, Toronto who run a Family Camp. Second purpose is to support retreats smaller groups looking for a reflective experience in nature; examples include the camp's Golden Retreat, and many different sewing and like groups. The third purpose is to rent the camp to groups who are not in conflict with the camp's purpose, such as family reunions. Camp Lutherlyn is getting out of the business to rent to large events such as weddings.
- 2. A focus on our people (a) our great seasonal camp staff (b) partner with local contractors to handle specialized property work, and finally (c) to continue to work with great camp volunteers, with some changing roles; our volunteers are aging and can't provide the time and expertise to do the specialized property work hence more contractors. We still have volunteer crews who sponsor a cabin at camp. St. John's sponsors Cabin 6. Randy, Gerald, Mel, Lorne B, Cory, Dave and Alison helped out on May 4th work day part of 51 volunteers who came from 7 congregations. A new role of volunteers is for marketing Camp Lutherlyn they are called Camp Lutherlyn Liaisons (or CLL's). We now have 14 volunteers in that role. Pastor Norine is the CLL for St. John's, Arnprior. Thanks from the Board to St. John's for all the support for the camp volunteer time and campership support.
- 3. Last, Camp Lutherlyn will become Ontario Camps Association (OCA) Certified. It involves following a number of best practice regulations around management, health care, food service, campsite facility and equipment maintenance all things that the Board believes in, does informally today, and many of which are now legislated by the Ontario government under new regulations for recreational camps. Finally, a big why we approached the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa re endorsing Camp Lutherlyn to their congregations something that would extend our marketing reach from 35 ELCIC congregations in our catchment area to 223 ELCIC and Anglican churches. The Diocese strongly believes in OCA accreditation to ensure our camp is run safely and is perceived to be committed to safety; the accreditation is required for their endorsement.

The Business Plan expects 3 benefits: the additional marketing support (CLL's, increased camperships, and Anglican endorsement) should double camp attendance by 2022. Volunteer workload becomes manageable by 2020. And the camp is financially sustainable without SYNOD grants and able to put maintain an adequate reserve fund for capital needs, by 2022.
