What authority do we have to be obedient to? I guess it depends on the circumstance!

I live on a cul de sac, at the end of the street. There are two young boys who ride their bicycles on the road when no one is around. Even though the rest of us are careful about driving on our street, whenever one of us pulls out to leave, the dad or mom calls out to the boys to stay still. And they do. But what would happen if they didn't obey their parents? They might get physically hurt by a driven car. They also might get a dressing down or scolding from their parents, or their bikes might get confiscated for awhile. The boys honor their father and mother.

Jesus has been in conflict with the religious authorities - the Pharisees- since the first days of his ministry. For three years he has been in running conflict with these people. His trustworthiness was brought into question by them. They wanted to see Jesus credentials.

In our world today we have information just flying at us constantly from every angle. If one hears certain rhetoric very often, eventually certain people begin to believe the lies. We have seen this happen in our neighboring country.

How do we learn who & what to trust, and who & what NOT to trust? Did these chief priests expect Jesus to reach into the folds of his garments and pull out official papers signed by a King and confirmed with an official seal in wax? Well, probably, but that wasn't going to happen! They would be mightily disappointed.

Instead of offering credentials Jesus engaged them in one of their own favourite games, that is - asking tricky questions. Then he told them the parable of the two sons. He also told them that sinners and prostitutes would enter the reign of God

ahead of them. Jesus actually told them a series of stories. When they listened closely these elders did NOT look good in any of them.

They were furious! They wanted to arrest him, but they were afraid the crowds would protest. By now the general public regarded Jesus as a prophet. He had street smarts and credibility with all kinds of people. He also carried all authority on heaven and earth. Street creds can be fickle but the authority of God is everlasting.

Our own reformation history of believing in scripture alone, faith alone, and grace alone, provides a guide for discerning what is authoritative and trustworthy when it comes to our faith.

As children of God we carry precious credentials. Our foreheads are marked with the cross of Christ forever. We are sealed by the Holy Spirit. Jesus story is an invitation from him to go and do God's work in the vineyard - the messed up world and communities that we live in. We may not always do this ministry exactly perfect but we try to do it to the best of our ability.

Our good intentions do not always lead to actions or commitments. God calls us to work in the world in our everyday lives. We do that through word and deed, as we strive for justice for all and peace for all.

This is the consequence of encountering and engaging with Jesus. He is not interested in discussing the meaning of life. Today He confronts us with the issue of his identity, and the call to faith in him. In 2020 he is still asking us — who do you say that I am? He does not allow for beating around the bush. He will do whatever it takes to call us to faith in him.

Our Christ has a jester like quality – a holy foolishness about Him. His spirit will never be controlled or captured. He eludes our grasp - and he confounds us and claims us all at the same time.

We say yes to respond to God's gracious invitation. We gather together to give thanks and to ask for the healing of our bodies, minds and spirits and then we go out into the world to serve with joy. Amen
