## **Preparing for worship:**

## Good morning - welcome to worship,

Gather everyone in your household together this morning. If you are not alone - assign parts of this beforehand. If you don't have a Bible you can google the scripture readings and print them out too. Perhaps print out copies of this for everyone present. This Liturgy is from the Lutheran Book of Worship and the modified prayers this morning are based on those from Sundays & Seasons Hymns are from the ELW & LBW.

Shut off all the distractions in your home. Sit in the quiet for a bit – take some deep breaths. Light the candle.

## Celebrating Thanksgiving this year is very important.

When we take look around the world, we are a very fortunate people to be living in Canada at this time in history. Yes, I know we all are constantly talking about the effects of the virus on all of our activities. Many times, I too have questioned some political/public health decisions or the lack of them, but I also know I would not want to be living in a place where these decisions are taken lightly. Perhaps I could be asking us to lament, or to cry for justice, or to call for action. These things have their time and place. But today, as I read Luke's gospel, I am reminded that of all of our responses to events blessed or challenging, great or small, one of the most powerful and overlooked is that of giving thanks.

When we give voice to being thankful it is a choice with consequences. As we express our gratitude, we affect those around us, even shape the reality in which we live.

Jesus runs into a group of ten lepers, unclean and outcast. They approach him for healing, but they too keep their distances as they have been trained by bitter experiences to expect little from those around them. In response Jesus instructs them to go and show themselves to the local priest — which is a promise made by implication that they will be made well. Indeed, as they travel they are made well- cleansed of their infirmity. When one of them notices, he turns back to express his gratitude, falling at Jesus feet in a posture of worship to give thanks.

The other nine did nothing wrong. In fact, they did exactly as they were told and presumably also enjoyed healing. They received the blessing promised to them.

The one who turns back is identified, recognized, and affirmed that he not only saw that he was healed – but he also returned to give thanks.

Jesus concludes his exchange by inviting the man to rise and go on his way and saying that his faith has made him not only physically well, but also whole and indeed, saved.

Family Thanksgiving traditions will be different this year. We shouldn't have our whole extended families with us to share a meal, and we will miss that. It means that we need to be intentional about staying in touch with them. We are not even supposed to invite our senior neighbor - who already lives alone. So, what can we do for them? Even a phone call breaks the isolation that many people are feeling.

Gratitude is not the only emotion we might choose to express in response to the events of any given day. There are reasons for fear, for anger, for frustration, grief, for regret, for apprehension. Each and all of these colors our experience, makes its appearance on the stage of our lives, and perhaps each has a place and role to play from time to time. But we *choose* how much stage time to grant each of these emotions by giving them expression, and as we do so we give them power in our lives. But gratitude draws us out of ourselves into something larger, bigger and grander. It also frees us from fear, releases some of our anxiety, and empowers us to do more and dare more than we would ever imagine.

Even to return to a Jewish rabbi, to pay homage when you a Samaritan realize that you are more than a Samaritan or a healed leper - you are a child of God whole and accepted and beautiful just the way you are.

Today as we celebrate communion, we are thankful or grateful for the bread of life, our Lord. His blessings are all around us. His love will not let us go. He searches out those who feel lost and rejected. The bread of life brings wholeness and healing. He helps us to confront evil and injustice. The bread of life for all. The bread of life broken up for each one of us and scattered like breadcrumbs around the foot of the cross.

As we give thanks for all of these things in our lives we notice even more and are blessed yet again. Thankfulness opens up a world of mercy, abundance and grace.

We have the power to shape those around us, push back the tide of resentment and complaint that bothers us, and make room for a fresh appreciation of God's renewing, saving grace.

I am thank full for each and every one of you. For the faith you have shown over this challenging year here in this place. For everything that you do for our faith life together, that has drawn us closer to God and to each other in faith, and hope, and love. Amen
